#### 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

• Poona College of Arts, Science & Commerce is a minority institution affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University and adheres to the curriculum designed and prescribed by the university. Many senior faculty members are actively involved in framing the curriculum as members of Board of Studies or as subject experts. • The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well-planned and documented process. • The College has well qualified teaching staff. Staff members are appointed as per the state Government, UGC and affiliating university norms. • The annual academic calendar is prepared prior to the commencement of the year by IQAC and the same is displayed for the teachers and students on college website and notice boards. • Meetings are held in each department at the end of the academic year to discuss about the course distribution for the upcoming academic year. Based on the teachers' expertise and experience, the syllabus is allotted accordingly. Every teacher is expected to submit their teaching plan well in advance before the commencement of the academic year. • Timetable is prepared prior to the commencement of the academic year by the time table committee. As per the workload, a department wise and faculty wise teaching as well as practical timetable is made. A classroom and laboratory timetable is also maintained to ensure smooth conduct of lectures and practicals. • The teachers make maximum use of modern methods of teaching. ICT is used extensively by most of the teachers. This includes YouTube videos, Google apps like Google form, Google classroom, PowerPoint presentation etc. to facilitate preparation of teaching plans, conducting class test, assignments. • The classroom teaching is supplemented with seminars, workshops, guest lectures, group discussions, tutorials, departmental fest, paper presentations, group assignments, educational tours, field trips, industrial visits, project writing etc. which are well planned for effective delivery of curriculum. Bridge courses and Remedial courses are also conducted to help the weak and meritorious students to excel in academics. • The central library of our college is well equipped with necessary learning resources for effective delivery of curriculum. There are more than one lakh books in the central library. All the faculty members have been provided with user ID and password for accessing N-List database that offers 31 lakhs and 35 thousand plus e-books and 6000 plus e-books journals in full text form. In addition to the central library, department libraries are set up by almost all departments in order to enhance the in-depth knowledge of the students. • IQAC plays an intrinsic role in the implementation of curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities of all departments. IQAC implements a system to

ensure syllabus completion by means of syllabus completion reports at the end of each term/semester. • An atmosphere of challenge and stimulation is maintained in all academic, co-curricular and extracurricular activities to ensure that the students are well prepared to meet and withstand the variety of challenges that will inevitably face in various spheres of life.

Feedback Obtained
<p>IQAC along with the feedback committee collects feedback from internal and external stakeholders. Duly collected feedback on various points are analysed and appropriate actions are taken on it. The objective of collecting feedback is to correctly gauge the impact of all the efforts taken by the institution at all levels for the various stakeholders. The institution wants the benefits to reach all the stakeholders. Based on the opinion of the stakeholders, further actions are suggested. The college collects and assesses the feedback from its stakeholders viz parents, alumni, students, employers and teachers. A format is prepared and distributed among all the stakeholders on different occasions, like Parent Teachers meet, Alumni Meet, Placement Mela and Exit meetings etc. The feedback is collected in the form of questionnaire with multiple choice options and scope for suggestions. The Institution collects feedback from parents on the occasion of the PTA meetings organised by the various</p>

departments. The feedback format is formulated to analyse the parents' opinion about their wards curriculum, the difficulty level of the curriculum, effectiveness of curriculum in getting employment, the usefulness of the field visits etc. Feedback from Alumni is taken during the Alumni meeting conducted by various departments. In addition, feedback forms are made available for the alumni who visit the departments. Feedback are duly collected from teachers also. As a community that keeps in touch with the different syllabi, revisions and the student standards from time to time, the most expert and resourceful suggestions are obtained from them. Students' feedback on curriculum is collected at the end of the semester/year. The suggestions made by the students are communicated to the concerned members of board of studies. Feedback is obtained from prospective employers, to gauge their opinion about the current curriculum and accordingly add on courses are initiated to make the curriculum effective and to increase the employability of the stakeholders. The data thus received is analysed and forwarded to the concerned department and authorities for a proper implementation of rules and changes, if any. General Action Plan after Data Collection and Analysis:

- Meetings are held at the department level to discuss the suggestions and feasibility of implementing the suggestions given in the feedback.
- To make curriculum more effective, several AddOn/skill development courses are conducted.
- More activities are planned for better results and holistic development on the basis of feedback received.
- Remedial courses and bridge courses are conducted based on the feedback received.
- The stakeholders strongly suggested that social and environmental consciousness be created among students. So visits to old age homes, orphanages, projects like wall of kindness, projects to empower women in the nearby locality were undertaken.
- For creating environmental consciousness projects like green thumb tree plantation, paper bags making skills, campaigns like Saaf Suthri Bakri Eid are undertaken.
- Many parents of BBA and BCA students suggested that the students be given more industrial and practical exposure, so more field trips and industrial visit are organised for the students.

### 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Institute has a well defined policy of mentoring newly admitted under graduate students. Institute admits students from various socio economical backgrounds, students from rural, urban and metropolitan regions, vernacular medium and from various states of the country. Diversified variety in students admitted in the institute at UG level. Such students arrives in the institute, they face many emotional, behavioural, language, economic and other difficulties for all these they need mentors to heed them to come out of these situation and gain confidence of facing such situations bravely. An induction program for fresh students during their inception organized by the

institute. They are provided with basic information about the institute, various courses conducted in the institute relevance of these courses, industrial and other requirements of the national and international community and they are also made aware of various career opportunities after completion of graduation and postgraduation. During the induction program students are well informed about their mentors and the type of help mentor can provide to the students who face difficulties. To cater to the needs of the mentees the institute assigns approximately 30 to 40 mentees per mentor during the academic year. In addition to this, departments individually organize orientation sessions on the class commencement day or first week for students of first semesters and explain the designing and implementation of the mentoring system of the department. In the mentoring process, all necessary information related to the student such as the contact number, email of the student, family income, category, gender etc. are initially collected by the respective faculty/department through the student database format provided by the IQAC. One to one interaction of mentormentee is rendered to support them in overcoming the emotional and other difficulties. Departments maintain the records of class tests/surprise tests, attendance records, records of student seminars etc. related to the reviewing of the performance of the students. Departmental teachers maintain interaction with students through individual meetings, social networking sites and interaction boards of learning management system. Teachers discuss with parents during parentteacher meetings and try to identify the problems faced by students and related issues. This programs where in participants are mostly freshers helps them immensely in rebuilding their emotional and other barriers. Moreover, significant improvement in the teacherstudent relationship has been observed.

The affiliating university makes it mandatory to hold Continuous internal evaluation for all UG and PG Programs. Every year at the commencement of academic session, the CIE schedule is planned by each department and charted in the Academic calendar. At under graduate level, for Arts and Commerce, 80:20 pattern is followed. The internal assessment of term end is of 60 marks converted to 20 in final mark sheet. The final examination is of 80 marks. For science faculty undergraduate level, 40:10 semester pattern is followed. First year examinations are internally assessed for all faculties. Post Graduate Level for all faculties follows Choice Based Credit System (CBCS). As per the guidelines of the affiliating University, 50 percent of the assessment is



internal. The internal exams can be in the form of tests, assignments, open book exam, seminar, library work, multiple choice tests and Oral exam. This 50:50 assessment is semester wise. Termwise Formative and Summative assessments are carried out as part of the CIE process during academic year. The intellectual and skill based development of the student is evaluated and monitored on continuous basis through Formative assessments. Formative assessment is done through class test, class quiz, and student seminar on curricula topics, excursion reports, field work reports, and project work etc. At the end of each term, Summative assessment is done through termend examinations and finally through university examination.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

Academic calendar specifies curricular, cocurricular and extracurricular activities along with CIE time table. Yearly academic calendar uploads on institutional website. The college has to adhere to the academic calendar of affiliating university. Initially, the teachers prepare termwise teaching plan for each course assigned to him/her with due consideration to continuous internal evaluation (CIE) and submits to the head of the department. The departmental academic calendar is prepared by the heads of each department in consultation with the teachers in the department, highlighting curricular, cocurricular, extracurricular activities to be organized along with the type and schedule of internal evaluation. The Head of the department ensures that there is no overlapping of the activities in general and the CIE in particular at both the internal as well as the University level. The Academic calendar is then forwarded to the IQAC. The IQAC compiles the inputs received from the various departments and a comprehensive academic calendar is prepared and uploaded on the college website. The adjustment in dates is sometimes made subject to the examination schedule of the affiliating University. The stakeholders are updated through notices, announcements in the classroom, college website, SMS and what's app messages. Every department submits the compliance report of the academic calendar. IQAC ensures that the compliance through verification of documentary evidence.

The college ensures optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial resources for maintenance and upkeep of different facilities by holding regular meetings of various committees constituted for this purpose.

**Physical and academic Facilities:** The college has been upgrading its infrastructure on regular basis. Infrastructural amenities are timely upgraded and properly maintained. To meet the quality standards and needs, the IQAC makes proposals for infrastructure development to the purchase Committee chaired by the Principal. In accordance with the requirement, the college purchases or upgrades the infrastructure thus required. **Classrooms:** The Classrooms are well equipped with teaching aids. Some of the classrooms are having ICT enabled facilities. The college has sufficient number of ventilated and spacious classrooms equipped with LCD projector. **Laboratory:** The record of maintenance is maintained by laboratory assistant and supervised by Head of the concerned departments. Other measures to maintain laboratories are as follows:

- The calibration, repairing and maintenance of sophisticated laboratory equipments are done by the technicians of related owner enterprises.
- The microscopes used for biological and geological experiments are annually cleaned and maintained by the concerned departments and record of maintenance is maintained in concerned departments.
- Stock verification of chemicals and glassware are undertaken on annual basis.

**Library:** The central library of our college is well equipped with necessary learning resources. There are more than seventy five thousand books in the central library. All the faculty members have been provided with user ID and password for accessing NList database that offers 31 lakhs and 35 thousand plus ebooks and 6000 plus ebooks journals in full text form. The requirement and list of books is taken from the concerned departments and Head of Department are involved in the process. The finalized list of required books is duly approved and signed by the Principal. The library is partially automated and digitalized. Books, manuscripts and reports are maintained with special care by the library staff. Book binding and pest control is done on regular basis. At the time of examination students are availing night library facilities from 6.00 p.m. to 9.00 p.m. **Sports Facilities:** The department of physical education monitors gymnasium and sport facilities. Gymnasium facility is available for use to all staff members and students free of cost. **Building and Maintenance** The college building and infrastructure are maintained well. At the departmental level, Heads submit their requirements to the Principal regarding classroom furniture and other repairs is required. The college development fund is utilized for maintenance and minor repair of furniture and other electrical equipments. With the help of the 10 full time sweepers cleanliness of class rooms is maintained. They are well equipped with tools of cleaning such as mops, gloves etc. **Campus Beautification Committee:** The College has efficient and experienced gardener to maintain the lawns and flora of the College. Lawn is well maintained by the Gardner. The trees are pruned on regular basis.

The Heads of the Departments, in coordination with the faculty, Subject experts and members of Board of Studies make a yearly review to evaluate the course content, transaction and evaluation practices through course feedback from students. The findings of all these components are then finally communicated to IQAC for suggestive and corrective actions. The suggestions of the IQAC gets authorized after due deliberations with the college management and the authorities.

Examination and Evaluation

The Institution always strives to reform the examination and evaluation by adopting transparency, confidentiality and fairness in complete assessment procedure. The choice based credit system (CBCS) adopted by the Institution for all the postgraduate courses ensures academic flexibility and will be implemented for all undergraduate courses from the next academic year. The teachers involved in examination work have to enter the marks by their individual login and are solely responsible for any error that might creep in. This has ensured confidentiality, cautiousness and promptness in the examination work. Uses of Google tools for online



	assignments are also being encouraged.
Research and Development	The Institution strives to promote research culture by frequently organizing Conferences, Seminars, and Symposia on International, National, State and local levels in specialized interdisciplinary themes. The Institution has implemented a flexible procedure for submissions of research proposals and to have linkages with leading institutions for availing sponsorship, sharing of research facilities. It has also setup a Common Instrumentation Laboratory for faculty and students to utilize them for their research activities. The teachers are provided with financial support to attend and present papers at distant locations in India and abroad. The staff and students achievers are also suitably felicitated and awarded.

Planning and Development	The College is a minority institution which is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University. The proposals planned for development and its continuation are submitted online to the parent University, in response to which it (the university) constitutes various committees for deliberating on issues such as Local Inquiry Committee (LIC), affiliation of new courses, continuation of existing courses, sanction of research centers and grants etc. Online Annual Reports are also submitted to the entities such as parent University, All India Survey on Higher Education (AISHE) under the aegis of Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD), participation in NIRF and MIS information to the Government of Maharashtra.
Administration	The college website plays a pivotal role in publication of Notices and other informative documents from where it can be comfortably downloaded by all concerned. SMS Bulk messaging is also used for instant notices, reminders and alerts. Attempts are being made to achieve maximum paperless communication using the Google tools available. Biometric attendance of the entire staff is obtained and the record updated. Every nook and corner of the college is also under the surveillance



of Closed Circuit Television (CCTV) which is monitored by the authorities. Detection of any deviance from normal and routine course of work is alerted by SMS. For general awareness, publicity and updating of college activities on social networking tools such as LinkedIn, Facebook, Blogs and WhatsApp are extensively used.

Finance and Accounts

Tally ERP software is used for all finance and accounts related matters and for the generation of various reports such as Consolidated Day Book, General Day Book, Daily Cash Collection report etc. Salary of the entire staff is disbursed by online transfers. PF and EPF proposals are submitted by online mode. Income Tax deductions at source (TDS) of all the staff and other audit submissions are also done by online mode only.

Student Admission and Support

The college website (www. akipoonacollege.ac) uses VriddhiERP software for the implementation of admission process, maintenance of academic records and attendance of students. Other issues handled by the ERP are timetable, examination form submission, subject selection, seat allotment, marks entry etc. Admissions are completely online by a transparent merit based system (Partially). However the submission of Admission form printouts, attestation of support document photocopies, counseling of subjects are manually done by the deputed staff from the respective counters. Google tools such as Google classroom, Google form etc. are being used for circulation of study material, notes, classroom and individual assignment allotments, feedbacks, online MCQ based tests for continuous evaluation etc.

Examination

The examination process of all the first year undergraduate courses is managed by the college VriddhiERP Software which handles the processes of online application, selection of subjects and courses, submission and acceptance/rejection of examination forms, generation of seat numbers and admit cards, assessment marks entry, publication of results and its printing, result summary and analysis etc. The examination process of second and third year of undergraduate and all

post graduate courses of the college are accomplished by online mode by the website of the parent university. The allotment of examination duties (dates, sessions, blocks etc.) to the staff, examination block seating arrangements, deputation of support staff, retrieval of question papers from the university, central assessment program are implemented by software based mechanisms.

Best Practice I Title of the Practice MUSKAAN: The healing smile Objectives of the Practice Being Socially responsible is described as the way we are making a difference to the social and economic wellbeing of our communities through our teaching, public events and activities. The objective of establishing Muskaan are To make the young students sensitive to the condition of the poor, needy, old, sick and underprivileged section of our society. To involve the youth in the upliftment of the marginalised and socially weaker section of society without any profit motive but simply on human grounds. To enable the youth make sure the fabric of social integration is woven into young minds To make them realise their responsibility towards the underprivileged section of our society. To raise funds and resources for pursuing charitable and philanthropic activities The Context In todays globalised world, every individual is trying to get position as well as money. Each youngster is joining the competition of accumulating maximum wealth. No doubt, the aim of education is to make every individual capable to earn his own livelihood, but before that, the aim of education is to make them more human so that they understand the suffering of other human beings. Todays youth is equipped with latest technology so much so that they are engrossed in games like PUBG or are busy on social media. Even when critical accident takes place and the victim needs help desperately, we find people busy taking videos and forwarding on social media instead of helping them. The context for establishing Muskaan: The Healing Smile is to make todays youth more sensitive to the suffering of other human beings. If we want the society to be a better place, we must develop the feeling of sympathy and empathy in our youngsters. We need to make the youth realise that it is good to make money but they should share it or give a part of it to the person

who is in real need. In this way, they understand the importance of giving and there also experience the joy of giving and contribute in making this world a better place for one and all. The Practice Poona college is the only college in Pune city to have undertaken this social initiative for the welfare of the society. The Muskaan volunteers have undertaken several projects like wall of kindness, sewing machine donation, gettogether of a kind etc. Muskaan volunteers, joined hands with the Pune Cantonment Board and got full fledged support from Ms. Priyanka Shirigiri, Vice President, Pune Cantonment Board who gave us a wall in the heart of Pune city. The wall is beautifully painted and maintained by the volunteers of Muskaan. The idea behind the project like wall of kindness undertaken by Muskaan volunteers is to reach to the needy and deprived section of the society by making available clothes, sweaters, blankets, etc to the people who cannot afford. People who do not need a set of clothes or other useful items can deposit them in the donation boxes which are located near the Wall of kindness, these clothes are then mounted on the pegs of the wall of kindness and the needy can take whatever they want, without being questioned. The motto behind the wall of kindness is take what you need and leave what you don't. This wall just turns out to be a give and take between the needy ones and the ones who want to contribute to help the needy ones. Generally wall is one thing which is known to create a partition or divide. We can say that wall symbolizes segregation of various communities, but this wall of kindness has a different meaning it is uniting people from all walks of life on an unprecedented scale. This wall of kindness is for lending a helping hand to the poor people for whom it is difficult to make the ends meet. There is no stipulation, no rule just give and take between those in need and those who want to help the one in need. Muskaan volunteers are playing a major role of bridging the gap between the haves and the havenots of Pune city. This wall of kindness is more than just donating. It is a symbol to celebrate humanity and solidarity across Pune city. Donation of sewing machines: Muskaan Volunteers donated two sewing Machines. These youngsters understand that women play variety of significant roles in our society from their birth till the end of life. They believe that training women with skill is a great way to provide opportunity to the underprivileged women to start their own business or to get a job to come out of poverty. These young volunteers thought that donating sewing machine will help them in skill training that will help them lifelong. This will provide great opportunities for women and girls to further develop their marketable skills and therefore a little step towards selfindependence. This will allow them to earn a living from home to support their families.

Muskaan: The Healing Smile understands that money in the form of sewing machine will go to support a grass root cause where every donation makes a difference. A Celebration of its Kind: Bridging the Gap between Teaching, Nonteaching and Menial Staff Muskaan: The Healing Smile organized a special evening for the teaching, nonteaching and menial staff on 8 February 2019. This was a special celebration in Poona college in which the Muskaan treated the teaching staff, nonteaching staff and menial staff along with their families. This celebration was itself a proof that Poona College believes nonteaching staff is as important as the teaching staff . The event highlighted that status and societal designations are nothing but just tags and that at the end of the day we are plain and simple human beings Evidence of Success The students have showed enthusiasm and willingness to do more and more programs for the social and economic wellbeing of the society. There has been a sense of empathy and love that has been awakened in the students. They are slowly mastering the art of giving. Problems Encountered and Resources Required To run any social initiative the most important thing which is needed is funds. The students do contribute in the form of cash and kind directly to the needy, however to make this a sustainable activity a regular and demarcated amount of fund needs to be set. Ours is a college being run by a trust which is already catering to the orphans and the needy. Since it is difficult to earmark funds especially for

social initiatives we are unable to take the activities to a grand level. Best Practice II Title of the Practice – Environmental Awareness Drive Through tree plantation Objectives of the Practice: The underlying concept of the practice is to spread awareness about environment using stipulated framework To inculcate among the students awareness for ecology right from the grass root level. Stabilizing soil to prevent erosion near Khadkwasla Dam Plantation of saplings for protection of the environment and making Pune cooler and greener The Context Against the context of threat to health and pollution that is pervasive everywhere and which is contributing to the climate change and destroying the environment at large the consciousness for environment protection should be instilled in students at the grass root level. Adding to Maharashtra government’s initiative of “Mission Plantation” provoked the need to look at this problem more closely. The Practice Every Year, all the Second year undergraduate students adorn the cap of “Green Army” and visit Green Thumb NGO at Khadkwasla which works for eco restoration in Pune. Our students have planted over 2500 plant saplings over the last two years which are growing into shrubs and trees around the dam, which in turn is encouraging birdnesting on a large scale, these are not only providing habitat to flora and fauna in that area but is also allowing afforestation. Evidence of Success: The success of a tree plantation can be measured accurately only after a passage of at least 8 to 10 years from plantation however as confirmed by green thumb NGO almost 96 Percent of the trees planted are blooming and flourishing. Problems Encountered and Resources Required Due to the plantation place (Khadakwasla) being 21 KMS away from the college it becomes difficult to monitor the growth of saplings, though Green Thumb NGO is monitoring the growth a personal touch of the students for a longer duration is missing . To be able to draw out Maximum benefits from such drives, it is important that a major fund be earmarked for monthly/fortnightly visits by the students of the college.

### 7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

Distinctive to our Vision “Pursuit of Knowledge in the Service of Humanity” and in continuation with one of the tenets of our mission i.e. “ To uplift the deprived and academically weak students by empowering them with knowledge” we at Poona College provide Financial assistance/ Instalment facility/Fee waiver to our students. We strive that no student must be left behind or should become a dropout only due to financial constraints. The students that our college caters to mostly come from the economic weaker section of the society. The student may be bright academically but because of the financial constraints and holdbacks it becomes difficult for the student to pursue their education and to realize their full potential. These students are unable to pay the reduced/Subsidized fees even for grant in aid courses in one go. To enable them to realize their full potential and to get the best out of them, it was considered desirable by the management and authorities to initiate Fees instalment/ Fee concession scheme for the deserving students. This is a seed of kindness that we are continually sowing and hope that one day these students will be an asset to the community in particular and the nation at large. At the beginning of every academic year, students enrolling for UG/PG courses apply for financial assistance/ Instalment facility. At the time of application, they need to submit the form along with proof of their family income. The authorities conduct a very brief interview of these students and then based on the submitted documents and interaction the authorities decide and grant/reject



the applications for financial assistance/ Instalment facility. The above mentioned efforts and initiatives have resulted in noticeable improvements in students with regard to their selfperception, pride and their identity in their society. This increased awareness about themselves and their position in society has made them more confident and strong. There is a remarkable positive change in them, from being on the verge of dropping out due to financial constrains they transform into selfassured individuals ready to take on the world. However we strongly believe that since we cater to the financially backward strata of the society we must generate a pool fund or get grants from the government for furthering the cause of education especially for the deserving and meritorious students
